Ra'anana!

Ra'anana is an affluent city in the southern Sharon Plain of the Central District of Israel. It was founded in 1922 as an American-Jewish settlement, c.1 km south of the village of Tabsur, where an important World War I battle had taken place four years previously.

Tel Aviv!

Tel Aviv is a city on the coast of Israel by the Mediterranean Sea. It has lots of buildings from the 1930s with a style called Bauhaus, especially in an area called the White City. There are museums like Beit Hatfutsot, which shows the history of Jewish communities using pictures and videos. Another museum, the Eretz Israel Museum, talks about the country's archaeology, folklore, and crafts. It even has some old ruins from around 12th-century B.C. that they are digging up right there.

Ra'anana!

Every day is a miracle.

In Ra'anana, every day unfolds as a miracle, with a remarkable tale emanating from the synergy between Ra'anana and Tel Aviv. United by their connection to the needs of the nearby kibbutz Ahituv, the church embarked on a volunteering journey over the span of three weeks, spearheaded by Sis. Rubina as the leader. Approximately 40 church members joined forces to contribute their efforts at Kibbutz Ahituv, located near Hadera.

During this three-week period, the focus was on aiding agricultural endeavors, with tasks ranging from cucumber picking to pruning cherry tomatoes. The commitment extended to dedicating a day off each week, specifically every Saturday, demonstrating a collective dedication to supporting Israel's agricultural needs. This became particularly crucial as over 4000 islanders had returned home because of the present unrest, prompting the Filipino community to step in and offer their assistance out of hearts of love for Israel.

The volunteer shifts lasted six hours daily, commencing at 7 am and concluding at 2 pm, with participants responsible for arranging their own transportation. However, in a heartening gesture, the church covered transportation expenses for the final trip. Some members even contributed personal funds to subsidize bus costs.

(The chosen location for this impactful endeavor was Kibbutz Ahituv, situated just north of Netanya, a moshav in central Israel falling under the jurisdiction of the Hefer Valley Regional Council, boasting a population of 1,091 as of 2021.)

Jordan River!

Yardenit is a renowned baptismal site located on the **banks of the Jordan River** in northern Israel. Positioned near the Sea of Galilee, it holds significant religious importance, attracting pilgrims and visitors from around the world. The site is recognized for its tranquil surroundings, offering a peaceful and symbolic setting for baptism ceremonies. Pilgrims often choose Yardenit for its connection to the biblical Jordan River, where tradition holds that **Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist**. The area provides facilities for spiritual gatherings, ceremonies, and reflective moments, creating a serene atmosphere for those seeking a meaningful connection to their faith along the historic Jordan River.
